Lessons from the 2007 Floods: what people need

> Maintaining power and water supplies and protecting essential services

Better advice and help for people to protect their families and homes "A national flooding exercise should take place at the earliest opportunity in order to test the new arrangements which central government departments are putting into place to deal with flooding and infrastructure emergencies" *Pitt Review, recommendation 49*



National objectives

- Test the response to a wide-area flooding emergency from COBR down to multi-agency gold level
- Test National Flood Rescue arrangements
- Test **plan activation** arrangements
- Test **communication arrangements** at all levels
- Test media management at all levels
- Test **business continuity** of essential service providers
- Test **mutual aid** across Local Resilience Forum/DA boundaries
- Test **mass evacuation** and sheltering arrangements
- Test implementation of **other relevant Pitt recommendations**
-against *real* conditions



Watermark

Supporting community action, testing professional response

Framework

Core component

- Command post style exercise
- "live" interaction
- COBR and Gov Depts
- SCG/GOLD
- Pseudo media
- Multi-agency players
- Central co-ordination and direction to manage exercise
- IT services to support



Bolt-on exercises

- Live and table-top exercises organised by Cat 1 and 2 responders
- Optional live interface with the core
- Exercise local Multi Agency Flood Plan arrangements
- Locally planned and managed using branded material

Community activities

- Participation by businesses, community groups, schools etc.
- Advice, presentations and scenarios available via Information Packs
- No interactive play with the core exercise

We practiced response to:

- Over **200,000** flooded properties
- ½ million people flooded out of homes
- **400,000** people self-evacuated
- **135,000** people requiring assisted evacuation
- Over 17,000 people needing water rescue
- **18,000 people sheltering** above flood waters
- Over **3,000 casualties**
- 391 fatalities

Our successes from the exercise include:

- We exercised the Flood Forecasting Centre with National Partners for the first time
- We used our new Flood Warning Codes, and tested our partners' understanding of them
- We provided support to Defra and COBR (Cabinet Office Briefing Room), and to local partners and communities
- We are more pro-active in our work with the media
- We resourced all our incident rooms and supported all requirements of the multi-agency (external) groups



My key recommendations...

- Prepare data now so we have it ready for an incident;
- Improve our flood visualisation abilities;
- Better use of technology for information sharing and reporting data;
- Improve skills and confidence in incident response;
- Continue to promote our flood warning arrangements to our partners;
- Continue to promote awareness of flood risk to individuals and communities.
